Careers Week

The week before work experience saw the Year 10s taking part in numerous careersbased activities. This kicked off on the Tuesday with employability skills activities run by our teachers. This involved problem solving, communication and team building sessions. Wednesday saw external providers delivering sessions on post-16 options such as T-Levels, vocational courses at college, the importance of work-life balance with a kick boxing session and apprenticeships. On Thursday, students produced a CV ready for future use as well as listening to incredible speakers such as a forensic firearms officer from the Metropolitan Police, a BBC TV and film producer and a local construction company who advised students on routes into their industries. Alongside this we had 6 external people who gave the year 10 students mock interview opportunities.

Finally, on Friday we had Mr Beezy, a motivational speaker, who delivered an assembly and workshops with smaller groups of students. The students enjoyed the week's activities and many of the staff too.

A Snippet of KS3 Curriculum

Each term, we will provide an insight into the KS3 curriculum for a range of subjects

Performing Arts

In music lessons this term, students continued to develop their keyboard skills, while also learning about the elements of music, chords and chord progressions, the Blues, Holst's Planet Suite and some basic composition. Some classes also explored African drumming and digital music production.

In year 7 drama, students experimented with performing Shakespeare, which supported them to access 'The Tempest' in English and links to their study of 'Macbeth' next year. Year 8 drama students looked at some basic dance skills and then applied these to the development of physical theatre sequences. In year 9, students continued to hone their dramatic performance and analytical skills in readiness for some of them to progress into GCSE Drama next year.

We are happy to share that performing arts lessons will increase next academic year so that years 7-9 will have one lesson of either music or drama every week, effectively doubling their contact time with the subject.

We are thrilled to offer the children of our community increased exposure to the arts, which is vital for the development of empathetic and creative young people.

The Community Music Centre that has started at ESJ this term will also continue next year, giving our students access to affordable music tuition to learn piano, singing, guitar or drums. We will be offering a scholarship of one-term of free access to these lessons to our new year 7s through a generous donation from Epping Rotary

Science

In year seven, we have been considering eating and heating! Over the summer term year sevens have started with chemistry and have been looking at how solids, liquids and gases behave in different states. Students have been putting their investigative skills to the test in observing what happens to the three states under different temperatures. In biology, they have deepened their knowledge on ecology; looking at how animals in different food chains interact and how we as humans can limit our interference to our biodiversity.

In year eight, the order for the term has been bread, rocks and space! Starting in biology looking at how unicellular organisms such as bacteria and fungi are used in food production, students had to draw on their knowledge of microscopes in year seven to really appreciate how the advancements in microscopy have prompted these scientific discoveries. Following on from this we had a look at different types of rocks, the role of magma in forming them, and how they are used in building. Finally, we ventured into space to examine how our solar system fits together, how celestial bodies move and interact, and how forces that they learnt in year seven can explain these interactions. The study of space culminated in a fun outdoor rocket experiment, where students had to create enough pressure in a water bottle to launch it into 'space'.



In year nine, the focus was drugs, mixtures and electrocution! Students were treated to an electrifying series of lessons on static and current electricity, with topics to stretch their imagination such as explaining how solar-powered electromagnets are used in extra-terrestrial travel. From here, back to earth with medicines. Students revisited topics of health from year eight by examining different ways of treating and preventing diseases, from definitive methods such as drugs and vaccines to more abstract methods like the placebo effect. Finally, we finished the year strong by putting students through a series of separation techniques designed to reinforce the practical skills they will find so essential in GCSE.

Mr. Ivermee (Key Stage 3 Co-ordinator Science)

RE

In year 7 this term, we studied: Hinduism. This scheme of work was an exciting and fascinating journey that explored the rich history and mythology of Hinduism. Through the study of Hindu Gods, including the Trimurti, and Hindu Mythology, including the epic story of Rama and Sita, students were able to gain a deeper understanding of the complex beliefs and practices of this ancient religion. The scheme also explored the 4 Ashramas, or stages of life, and how they relate to Hindu spirituality and philosophy. By the end of the scheme, students were able to have a deep appreciation for the beauty and complexity of Hinduism, and a greater understanding of the role of religion in shaping our ideas about the world and our place in it.

In Year 8, we studied: Understanding Racism. This scheme of work was an thought-provoking journey that explored the complex issues of prejudice, discrimination, and equality. Through the inspiring stories of Christians and Muslims who have fought for equality, such as Stormzy, Martin Luther King, Malcom X, and Prophet Muhammad, students learned about the power of activism and how it made a real difference in the world. The lessons encouraged critical thinking and debates, as students grappled with the difficult questions surrounding the representation of good and bad people in history. By the end of the scheme, students had a deeper understanding of the impact of racism and discrimination, and were equipped with the tools to make a positive change in their own lives and communities.

In year 9, we studied: Religion, Human Rights and Social Justice. This was another exciting and thought-provoking journey that explored the complex issues of human rights, equality, gender, discrimination, and positive discrimination. Through the study of Christian and Muslim views on these themes, students developed a deeper understanding of the role of religion in shaping our ideas about social justice. The scheme encouraged critical thinking and debate, as students discussed difficult questions surrounding issues such as the

Illegal Migration Act in the UK, and the transformation of British law. We also explored the place of gender equality and debates around the implications of positive discrimination. By the end of the scheme, students had the chance to explore their own views on such complex issues; practiced verbal and written skills in debating; and felt inspired to be future advocates of positive change in society.

Miss. Zare (Head of RE and Christian Ethos)

History

This term, year 7 students have reflected on power and how it changed over the Medieval era due to events such as Plague and the changing role of the monarchy and Parliament.

In addition, students have considered social issues and the impact of religion. It is important to consider how England developed as a nation and consider reasons why we were not always 'living well together'. This refers both to health as well as how we related to other countries.

Over this term, year 8 have focused on social and industrial change in relation to the Industrial Revolution, both the causes and processes that brought this about, as well as the consequences.

Topics that have linked directly to this that students also studied are the Enlightenment and Slavery. These are a key part of British History and enable students to understand the negative aspects of British History as well as the positive. This is important as it enables students to consider the rights of all people and the equality that we should continue to fight for, for all people in society. It has been a packed term for y9. The theme for this term has been Globalisation. To enable students to reflect on this, we have studied USA and the world in the 1920s, what lead to, and the impact of, the Great Depression and its role in world conflict.

In addition, we consider the consequences of WW2 by reviewing The Cold War; role of a Superpower, causes and issues of the Cold War; as well as the impact of personalities involved.

Students have built on this and its role in creating tension in the Middle East; the creation of Israel, growth of Palestinian resistance/terrorism and other Arab states.

I think it is safe to say, our key stage 3 students have been given a thorough lesson in why studying the past can have such an impact on our future!

Bringing Learning to Life

New Views

Throughout this academic year, students from year 10 and 12 have been participating in the National Theatre's New Views program, a developmental project to train the next generation of playwrights.

Working with a professional playwright from the National, our students drafted their own original plays which presented their 'new views' on subjects close to them. 
A-Level Spanish Study Day
